# BIENNIAL REPORT OF THE IOWA STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

In order that the askings of the State Board of Education for the next biennium may be understood, a word historical is necessary.

The situation in which we find ourselves is the direct result of the war. America entered the war in April, 1917. The 37th General Assembly had made its appropriations for the biennium ending on June 30, 1917, before our entrance into the war. They were adequate for the legitimate needs as they were foreseen at that time. What effect the war would have on the schools immediately became a matter of concern. What happened was this: Hundreds of students and faculty members immediately volunteered. the draft, which, for the time being, promised to deplete the student body absolutely, so far as male students were concerned, leaving only the young women and such men as could not qualify physically for military service; but, in the summer of 1918, the S. A. T. C. (Students' Army Training Corps) plan was brought forward and adopted by the government; the object being to have college students subject to draft and qualified for service trained in college camps while pursuing their studies, as far as the major necessity of the moment would permit. This scheme, conceived with the best intentions, while it kept many students in college for a time, did not prove an unmixed blessing. It led to more or less confusion and entailed not a little outlay, generally unrelated to ordinary college expenses—outlay for which, in the very nature of things, the institution could not be wholly compensated by the government.

The college year 1917-1918 was, at best, a year of confusion, some depletion of the student body, and not a little disorganization. The places of faculty members who entered the service of the government were held open for them. Whenever possible, their work was carried on by their colleagues; and when this was impossible, men were employed temporarily to carry on their work.

When the college year 1918-1919 opened, the prospects were anything but encouraging. It looked as though the attendance would be cut in two and the faculties hopelessly scattered. Happily, the fortunes of war changed; and in November, 1918, fighting ceased. It

was not expected that conditions would return to normal during this college year, however, and they did not so return.

As the year progressed, it became clear to the executives, faculties and members of the governing body that, on getting back to a peace basis, there would be a greatly increased attendance in colleges everywhere. The reasons for this conclusion were clear. The war had demonstrated, as nothing else could have done perhaps, the advantage held by him who had been trained in thought and action. Never before had the value of systematic training been so strikingly brought to public attention, and it followed as a matter of course that the advantages offered by modern institutions of learning would be more eagerly sought after than ever before.

Believing this, the Board of Education presented to the 38th General Assembly a program calling for sums which seemed large as compared with sums previously requested. These askings were received in the best possible spirit, and would have been granted, we think, in their entirety except for this fact, namely, that the members of the General Assembly expected to be called in extraordinary session in January, 1920, to consider code revision. So believing, they said to the Board, in effect, this: "Your program is an ambitious one. It is based on the expectation of largely increased attendance in all colleges. Neither you nor we know to a certainty whether or not these expectations will be realized. By next January, the matter will have been made clear; and we shall be in session and ready to act according to the necessities as they may appear at that time. This being true, we will make such appropriations as will permit you to carry on up to the time we can act, if action be necessary."

To such a proposition, made in such spirit, what could reasonable men do but acquiesce without complaint? Everybody acted in good faith.

You know the sequel. The expectations as to attendance were realized. Whereas the University had, in the college year 1918-1919, 4,102 students, a year later they had 4,933 students. On the 20th of November, 1920, they had 5,235. At the State College they had, for the college year 1918-1919, 3,530; and a year later they had 4,361 students. On the 20th of November, 1920, they had 4,482. The attendance at the State Teachers College has not materially increased, but the cost of teaching service and everything that enters into the upkeep of the institution has increased there as well as elsewhere,

and this institution has greatly enlarged the scope of its activities by extending its service during the summer months to various portions of the state. During the past year, four extension summer schools were held—one at Centerville, one at Shenandoah, one at Estherville, and one at Carroll; and through the instrumentality of their study-center work, the entire state is made the campus of this institution.

The expectations as to the extraordinary session were not realized. To make a bad matter worse, certain other things, not foreseen nor taken into account when the legislative budgets were made up for presentation to the 38th General Assembly, developed. Most people, we think, expected that the cessation of hostilities would be followed by some reduction in the prices of commodities. Instead of decreasing, the prices of many of the common necessities advanced, not slightly, but drastically. For example, the price of coal increased more than 50 per cent. Freight charges, express charges, railroad travel, and various other items have increased, especially the cost of labor and material.

The situation was saved by just one thing—that during the period of the war, while faculty members were absent without pay and the student bodies depleted considerably, sums had been saved in various funds. It was the policy of the executives and the Board not to do anything in the way of the purchase of new material or equipment if it could possibly be avoided, owing to the prevailing high prices. No new projects were undertaken. These balances, strictly speaking, could not be used for educational support; but the Board, with the approval of the Executive Council and leading members of the General Assembly, did so use them. As a result, the budgets of the current year exceed the assured incomes as follows:

Therefore, in order to go on on the present basis, a sum-total of \$573,147 must be appropriated, in addition to the amounts provided by the 38th General Assembly.

At this point we wish to call your attention to the situation as it exists in the two institutions where there were no balances upon

which we could draw, namely, the School for the Deaf and the School for the Blind. The increased cost of food products, coal, labor, material and other service called for the expenditure of every cent available for those institutions; and the appropriations made by the 38th General Assembly for these schools were considered generous when made. As the school year ending in June, 1920, drew to a close, we were confronted with an exceedingly embarrassing situation. You are aware of what has taken place in the matter of salaries for grade teachers and high school teachers everywhere. These institutions parallel our public schools exactly, except that they have certain special courses adapted to their peculiar needs. The teaching force naturally expected that their salaries would at least be made to equal the prevailing salaries for grade and high school teachers throughout the state. The employes in various capacities also demanded the current rate of wages. There was no money to make a single increase. In this emergency, the teaching staffs and employes were called together by the superintendents and the members of the Finance Committee. We explained to them exactly what the situation was. We had no money to increase salaries and wages, and we had no right to promise anything except that if they would stay by the institutions and continue their work we would request of the 39th General Assembly, immediately upon its convening, an emergency appropriation sufficient to make the salaries and wages conform to the current scale, so to speak, and to make it retroactive from the beginning of the school year in the case of teachers and from the beginning of the fiscal year in the case of other employes. With an exception or two, all took it for granted that justice would be done, and stood by. For this purpose, we are compelled to ask, for the School for the Deaf, \$27,500.00, and for the School for the Blind, \$15,000.00.

The situation with which we have to deal here in Iowa is not special. The same conditions prevail throughout the country. A New York expert who recently gathered statistics from 210 institutions, covering the period of the last six years, found a net increase in attendance of nearly 300,000. One effect of this has been an unparalleled scarcity of adequate teaching service. In the past two years it has been necessary for the Board to employ between 700 and 800 new persons on the teaching staffs of the different institutions. In securing this service, we were brought into constant competition with institutions similarly situated elsewhere. Some of the state in-

stitutions and many of the endowed institutions were in a position to pay salaries that have seemed high. Indeed, \$8,000.00 to \$10,000.00 is by no means an uncommon salary today for expert educational service; and salaries of from \$6,000.00 to \$7,000.00 are more common today than were salaries of from \$4,000.00 to \$5,000.00 two years ago.

Adjustments in the salaries of high school and grade teachers are well known to you all. The same forces have been at work in providing for teaching service in the higher educational institutions. Service that formerly was secured at from \$800.00 to \$1,000.00 a year is now receiving from \$1,500.00 to \$1,800.00. Service that formerly could be secured for \$1,500.00 cannot now be secured for less than from \$2,200.00 to \$2,500.00 a year. The cost of other grades of service has likewise increased.

Some of the neighboring states have already met the situation, through the action of their legislatures, either in regular session or in special session.

The main question, briefly stated, would seem to be this: Just how far does the state of Iowa wish to go in higher education? Shall we try to keep up with the procession or not? This sounds commonplace, but it isn't commonplace. We have heard it before, to be sure, but now we have to answer it. No one can have any doubt as to what this answer will be. The Board of Education, as has been its custom from the beginning, has carefully considered the requests submitted to it by the executives, and has sought to make no demand upon the legislature that does not commend itself to the Board's best judgment as being essential at this time. The amounts we feel called upon to ask at your hands seem very large. They are very large, but they contemplate no expansion in the direction of new projects to be undertaken. They contemplate only taking care of the increase in attendance and providing the scale of salaries and wages now current throughout the country. Adhering to this principle, the following legislative askings will be submitted to you by the Iowa State Board of Education:

### LEGISLATIVE ASKINGS

### A BILL FOR AN ACT

Making appropriations for the State University of Iowa, the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, the Iowa State Teachers College, the Iowa College for the Blind, and the Iowa School for the Deaf.

Be It Enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

Section 1. There is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to the State University of Iowa, the sum of one million, four hundred seventy-five thousand, nine hundred and forty-seven dollars (\$1,475,947) annually for each year of the biennium beginning July 1, 1921, for the following purposes:

Sec. 2. There is further appropriated, out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to the State University of Iowa for the biennium beginning July 1, 1921, the sum of four hundred eighty-four thousand, five hundred dollars (\$484,500) for the following purposes:

There is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, the sum of one million, four hundred sixty-seven thousand dollars (\$1,467,000.00) annually for each year of the biennium beginning July 1, 1921, for the following purposes:

The annual appropriations provided for in this section shall be paid on the order of the Iowa State Board of Education in monthly installments beginning July 1, 1921, with the exception of the appropriation for Summer Session (\$20,000), which shall be available July 1, 1921, and on July 1st of each year thereafter for the biennial period.

Sec. 4. There is further appropriated out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1921, the sum of four hundred four thousand, six hundred dollars (\$404,600.00) for the following purposes:

The total loans on June 30, 1920, were \$684,450.00, secured on approximately 16,330 acres of Iowa farm lands, the loans averaging practically \$42.00 per acre.

The interest on loan number 1109 for \$750.00 due January 1, 1920, is unpaid. This loan is for \$15,000.00, on 365 acres in Johnson county. The appraised value in 1917 was \$70,000.00. The owner's value was \$58,225.00, both exclusive of buildings. This is the only past due item in connection with the loans of this Endowment Fund.

## FINANCES OF THE IOWA STATE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND MECHANIC ARTS.

Report of the Secretary Regarding Receipts and Disbursements of All Funds from July 1, 1918, to June 30, 1920.

It has been the custom of the Secretary's office to so connect its biennial reports as to show a continuous history, through the years, of the financial operations of the institution. The present report, while more condensed than previous ones, traverses the same ground as the others and retains practically the same classifications. The college has two main purposes, namely, the conduct of an educational institution on the campus at Ames; and, second, the rendering of what may be rightly called industrial service for the state. Any intelligible exhibit of its finances must make sharp distinction between these two lines of institutional purpose and show the cost of each. With this idea in mind, the funds provided for the maintenance and development of the institution are classified as hitherto under the following heads:

#### Educational funds:

Collegiate support funds.
Non-collegiate support funds.
Vacation course funds.
Student fees.
Building, improvement and equipment funds.

#### Industrial Service funds:

Experiment funds. Extension work. Hog Cholera serum fund.

## II. INDUSTRIAL SERVICE WORK.

The college is, at the same time, an educational institution and a center of industrial service work for the state. In order that the legislature may clearly understand the cost of maintaining each, a sharp line of

distinction is drawn between the two in this report. At present, the industrial service work includes the following lines:

- 1. Extension work,
- 2. Experimentation.
- 3. Hog cholera serum.

## I. EXTENSION WORK.

## This includes:

- (a) Agriculture and Home Economics Extension.
- (b) Engineering Extension.

Considering these in their order, we have:

## (a) AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS EXTENSION

It is fourteen years now since this work received legislative sanction. For the first eight years, it was supported entirely by state appropriations. ## REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT, IOWA STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE.

Biennial Period Ending June 30, 1920. HOMER H. SEERLEY, PRESIDENT.

Herewith are submitted the statistics and other facts required by law for the use of the General Assembly and the Officers of the State. The two years covered have been much disturbed by conditions following the War, but the tide is now setting upward again and the demands for education of teachers through the division of extension, the departments on the Campus and the other activities of the College are beyond any previous experience. The expansion of expenses that are caused by present conditions necessitates an enlarged income for the next biennial period that will be provided by the State without hesitation when all matters involved have been investigated. The statistics that follow indicate a healthy and a progressive development of the work assigned to the Teachers College.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT, COLLEGE FOR THE BLIND.

#### F. E. PALMER, SUPERINTENDENT.

The biennial period just closed has been, for your superintendent and family, a time of great sorrow and suffering, as well as a time of abiding consolations and inspiration.

On October 1, 1918, just as the King of Day was appearing above the eastern horizon in the glory of the autumnal morn, our dear daughter, Lorna, passed into the "next room" of life.

Besides the passing of Lorna, I have to report to you the death of Meta White, a little colored girl from Des Moines, and John Nissen, our farmer, who was killed by a bull.

I cannot say too much in praise of the spirit of those who have been in the employ of the College. With little exception, they have been faithful and devoted, loyal and true, conscientious and painstaking. Sometimes the work has been exacting and of a nature that demands sacrifice, but whatever its character as a rule the call to duty has been met with a most generous response. Many times the hours have been long and the duties have been arduous, but still there has ever been manifested the spirit of devotion and loyalty. The exceptions are rare; the occasions are many indeed.

At first thought these averages seem rather high, but it should be remembered that many of the children who come to school here do not enter as early as is the custom in the schools for the sighted. The average of those who entered this year would probably be about nine years. Besides, progress in point reading cannot be quite as rapid for the average child as with those who can read print. Again the number in any one grade is not large and one pupil over age raises the average in a very marked degree. This result is manifest in the above averages. On the whole the work of the pupils has been satisfactory, and I believe that I am justified in saying that our pupils, for the most part, measure up to the attainments of pupils in the schools for the sighted. As in the schools for the sighted, there are among the students of the Iowa College for the Blind practically all grades of ability.

#### PROGRAM.

On the whole the program of school activities has been about the same as other years, although some changes have been made. Art weaving has been added to the list of industries; domestic science is required of all girls who have reached the sixth grade, and gymnasium work is given to all the students of the College, unless excused by the College physician. During the past year practically every student enrolled in the College has had an hour's exercise each school day in the gymnasium, and I believe that I am warranted in making the statement that the gymnasium work has been of great value to the students in many ways. Not only has it contributed to their general health, but it has given some of them a confidence in movement that they otherwise would not have gotten. In the near future we hope to add dictaphone work to the list of prevocational activities, and also give opportunity for expert typewriting preparation. This cannot be done until the course of study has undergone complete revision. At the present time only partial revision has been attempted. Briefly outlined, the day's program is about as follows, with few variations.

6:00 o'clock A. M. Rising. Students' breakfast. 6:45 o'clock A. M. Care of rooms, etc. 7:15 o'clock A. M. 8:00 o'clock A. M. Chapel. 8:30 o'clock A. M. to Recitations, Industrial and Gymnasium work. 10:20 o'clock A. M. 10:20-10:40 A.M. Recess. Recitations, Industrial and Gymnasium work, 10:40-11:30 A. M. 11:30-12:15 Dinner. Recitations, Industrial and Gymnasium work. 1:15- 4:00 P. M. 6:00 P. M. Students' supper. 7:00- 9:00 P. M. Study.

Saturdays are used for recreation, letter writing, sewing and mending, cleaning, etc. On Sunday, teachers and students meet at nine o'clock for chapel exercises. Following chapel the primary students assemble for Sunday school while the juniors and seniors are privileged to go to the Sunday schools of the various churches of the city. Following Sunday school students are expected to attend worship in the churches of their several choices. At three o'clock in the afternoon, the students' prayer meeting is held. Although attendance is altogether voluntary, yet the average attendance is about forty. Thus you will see that the week's program is rather full, but it is believed that a full program is much to be preferred to a program that admits of a great deal of leisure time. It has been my observation that our children are happiest when actively engaged in some purposeful occupation.

#### THE COURSE OF STUDY.

The courses of study include not only the subjects required for admission to the colleges and university of the state (Students who have graduated from our College Preparatory course are admitted to the state colleges without examination.), but also subjects that aim to prepare our students for some one of the several occupations in which it has been demonstrated that the blind are usually successful. In the choice of course of study the student is free to express his own desires, guided by the judgment of teachers and supervisors. However, the courses of study are so arranged that a student who chooses one, say one of the vocational courses, has the benefit of subjects in other courses. In other words, the several courses are so arranged that a student in one course is obliged to take work in other courses as minor subjets, regardless of whether the course is in the industrial, the music, or the academic department. For illustration, students graduating from the music department must have had as academic subjects English, including rhetoric and literature, history and a limited amount of science; and in the industrial department they must have had at least one of the several courses offered.

In order to graduate from the academic department the student must satisfactorily complete courses of study in English, including rhetoric and literature; history, both ancient and modern, as well as American; two years of Latin; physics; civics; typewriting; algebra and geometry and arithmetic; and may elect from the industrial and music courses.

On May 26, 1919, two students, Arthur Greene and George Schnepf, were awarded diplomas of graduation from the academic department.

On May 28, 1920, six students, Laurence Buroker, Fern Conn, Peter Kuiken, Donald Martin, Henry Strutz and Esther Turnell, were awarded diplomas of graduation.

In order to graduate from the industrial department, students must satisfactorily complete courses in English, history and algebra; in at least two courses for vocational work; and two years of typewriting. The industrial and vocational subjects now offered are as follows: Rug weaving, both plain and pattern; basket weaving, chair caning, broom making, piano tuning, typewriting, cooking and sewing, hammock weaving. In the near future we hope to add to the above list dictaphone operating and Sloyd,

In order to graduate from the music department a student must satisfactorily complete a thorough course in harmony, harmonic analysis, musical history, and staff notation. He must have as his major one of the following: piano, pipe organ, violin or voice, and is required to have a working knowledge of at least one of the other three. Students in the music department are required to take part in recitals at the discretion of the teacher.

For graduation recital in plano, the student's repertoire must include works by Bach, Beethoven, Chopin, Schumann, as well as some of the modern composers. During the year 1919-1920, seventeen boys and twenty-three girls have enrolled for the plano work. There have been a number of student recitals during the biennial period, but no graduation recitals for the plano, since no one has been granted graduation honors during that time. The student recitals have been of a high character and have been well received.

For private vocal work, leading to graduation, students of the College must have the recommendation of the head of the department before being enrolled for lessons. These recommendations are given only to those students who have good vocal possibilities. For graduation in this course, the student's repertoire must include folk songs, art songs, ballad songs and at least an opera aria, and one solo from an oratorio. During the biennial there has been one graduate from this department. Esther Turnell, of Boone, satisfactorily completed the course in voice work and was granted the diploma of graduation May 28, 1920.

In the voice department, students have been enrolled as follows: private voice culture, four boys and twelve girls; chorus work, fifty-three boys and forty-five girls.

The study of the pipe organ is open to all students of the High school who have a good fundamental piano technique and who have acquired a fair degree of poise and freedom at the piano keyboard. The recital for graduation must include a Bach Prelude and Fugue, a Mendelssohn Prelude and Fugue or Sonata, and several short and one long selection by more modern organ composers. During the year 1919-1920, five boys have been enrolled in the organ department of music. There have been no graduations during the biennial period.

The study of the violin is open to all students of the eight higher grades of the College. However, students are dropped from further study whenever it becomes evident that they do not have good possibilities in violin work. Standard violin works are studied and students are graduated whenever a fair degree of skill in the use of the violin has been reached. During the year 1919-1920, six boys and three girls have been enrolled in the violin department of music. All have been required to enroll in the junior or senior ensemble class.

#### IMPROVEMENTS.

During the biennial period the following improvements have been made in building and grounds:

- 1. A subway leading from the main building to the Industrial building has been constructed. This is a very great convenience, especially during inclement weather.
- 2. In the basement of the old industrial building which was sold and removed, a fine root cellar has been made. This is large enough to take care of the winter stock of vegetables and apples.
- 3. Greenhouse construction has been started. Owing to the increased cost of materials and labor it was found impossible to complete the greenhouse with funds that were available. A new appropriation will have to be made for this purpose.
- 4. A steel ceiling was placed on the basement of the new industrial building. Besides all tollet fixtures have been placed according to the original plans of the architect.
- 5. Apartments in the second story of the old carpenter shop were fitted up for the use of the engineer and family. It is a decided advantage to have the engineer on the ground day and night.
- 6. The old maple grove west of the hospital building was cut down and an orchard planted in its place. I believe that this is a good start toward the college raising its own fruit.
- 7. The plans furnished by Holm & Olsen of Minneapolis for landscaping the grounds have been largely followed. Hence a great many shrubs have been planted during the biennial period.

All of the above improvements were made at the lowest possible cost and I believe that every cent was economically used.

### THE STUDENTS.

Of course, the College exists primarily for the benefit of the boys and girls of Iowa who need the help of a school for the blind. I presume that during the biennial period that this report covers the institution of which I have the honor of being superintendent has not fully realized its ideals, yet there has been an honest endeavor to serve in the most efficient way. Because the institution exists primarily for the education of the boys and girls who are admitted to membership in its student body, therefore the emphasis at all times has been upon the problem of their education. We have tried to follow out the plans that would help to advance them to the ranks of useful men and women, when it shall be time for them to take their places in the life of the outside world. We have ever tried to realize that in some way or other, through the agency

of this school, they must be fitted to live more beautifully, more efficiently, more sanely, and more wholly. In song, in work, in study, in social contact, in religious communion, in play, we have tried to glorify life for them. I do not say that we have succeeded, but I can say our hearts have always supported this proposition. We have tried to realize that there are many doors to the temple of education, and we have endeavored to help the pupil find the one that will bring him closest to the divinity of his own soul.

The academic and industrial life of the students is perhaps the point of greatest emphasis, and yet care and consideration have been given to the social, physical and religious life as well. Occasionally, our boys and girls, together with their teachers, have met for social enjoyment. These have always been greatly enjoyed. For twenty minutes each school day, our boys and girls have been permitted to be together, on the east campus, under the supervision of teachers. It has so far been my observation that, on the whole, this plan has served a good purpose. It would seem to have worked well. Perhaps it is too early to draw conclusions, and so I offer none. I have yet to discover that the plan fosters intimacy between sexes, but, on the contrary, I am almost convinced, after nearly two years' trial of the plan, that a mutual self-respect has been cultivated. However, as before stated, it is too early to draw definite and indisputable conclusion, and therefore I await judgment.

The physical life of the students has been well cared for. As stated in the previous part of this report, each student is required to take exercise, under the direction of the gymnasium teacher, for at least five hours a week, unless excused by the College physician for obvious reasons. With few exceptions, I believe, this has been of great benefit to the physical well-being of the student body. Near the close of each of the two years of the biennial period the work of the year culminated in a gymnasium exhibition.

These proved to be remarkable exhibitions, and were clear demonstrations of the fact that the blind are responsive to training along physical lines.

Besides the gymnasium work, the nurse and physician give constant care for the health of the students. At least once a month the weight of every student is taken and recorded for comparison. It is a very good index of the pupil's general health. If the pupil is greatly under weight, or loses weight without apparent cause, the case is studied and the remedy sought. Perhaps it is the food; if so an attempt is made to find the proper diet. Perhaps it is overwork; if so the rest cure is ordered. I am glad to say that during the last year practically every student, with three or four exceptions, showed a normal gain in weight. This is only indicative of the care that students receive at the hands of the nurse and the physician. Dr. J. E. Luckey, the College physician, reports as follows:

I have the honor as physician of the Iowa State College for the Blind, to present the following report for the two school years of 1918-1919 and 1919-1920.

During the latter part of September and the first part of October, 1918, the school suffered a general epidemic of influenza.

Sixty-five pupils, seven teachers, three trained nurses and five employees contracted this disease. There were fifteen well developed cases of pneumonia, complicating these eighty cases of influenza. One of the teachers, Miss Palmer, daughter of our Superintendent, died from this pneumonia.

One colored girl pupil suffered from an exacerbation of an old chronic suppurative disease of the cervical glands terminating in a fatal meningitis.

During the period from November 1, 1918, to the close of school on May 26, 1919, there were fifty-four cases treated in the school hospital, which make, with eighty cases of influenza, one hundred thirty-four cases treated in the school hospital during the entire year.

The fifty-four cases above mentioned were:

Whooping cough	2

As can be noted above there were sixteen cases of pneumonia during the entire year.

A large number of minor affections not sufficiently serious to demand hospital care were treated as the occasion demanded.

During the year 1919-1920, twenty-four pupils were sent to the State University Hospital for special treatment.

During the past school year, from September, 1919, to May, 1920, there have been sixty-two cases treated in the school hospital. Of these fifty-three were pupils, five were teachers and four were employees. Among these there was but one serious case, which was due to an old chronic valvular heart disease. Most of the sickness was due to an infection of the respiratory tract and occurred during January and February.

During this year there was one fracture (green stick) of the bones of the forearm and a large number of the usual minor affairs that demand attention, but need no hospital care.

The pupils have gained in weight during the year.

At the beginning of the school year I have examined each and every pupil in search for signs of contagion or any defects that may necessitate correction. The school nurse, Miss Crowley. keeps a record of each pupil's weight and reports promptly any matters demanding the physician's attention. Any noticeable indisposition in any pupil is promptly reported by the teachers to the medical department of the school and the case receives prompt attention.

Any employee who has been ill is required to furnish satisfactory proof of the cause of the illness, so that so far as possible the institution may be protected against contagion.

Since the problem of food has come to be recognized as being rather closely related to the problem of education, it may be of interest to the Board to know something of the care that is exercised in regard to the food of the students. Great care is used in the selection of all the food that comes to the College, only the best qualities of food being selected. An endeavor has been made at all times to avoid an over supply at the table service, as well as an insufficient quantity of food. It is needless to say that this desire has not always been realized, but for the most part the results have been very satisfactory. It is impossible to avoid a certain degree of similarity of menus, although great care is exercised in the effort to avoid it. Once a week a carefully prepared menu is presented the cook and baker and as far as possible this is followed in the preparation of the meals. ### RELIGIOUS LIFE.

Regarding the religious life of the school, there is nothing that is essentially new to report. Our aim has been to make the religious life natural and simple. Six times a week chapel exercises are held for all of the students and teachers and others who may care to attend. The usual order is somewhat as follows:

Song by the School.

Prayer by the Leader, after which the school joins in the Lord's Prayer.

Prayer Response by the Choir.

Music by some of the pupils from the music department.

Scripture reading by the Leader.

Short talk by the Leader.

Song by the School.

These exercises are always of a non-sectarian character whose purpose is to direct the thoughts of the pupils and teachers into the channels of wholesome religious life. They are a part of the day's preparation and an endeavor has been made through the chapel half-hour to create a good mental atmosphere for the duties of the day.

In addition to the chapel exercises, that are always of a religious nature, student prayer meetings are held on Sabbath afternoons. Attendance is voluntary, but the meetings are usually very well attended. It is a student service, led by a student and supported by student activities, although under the sponsorship of one of the teachers. Church attendance is a student activities, although under the sponsorship of one of the teachers.

ance is largely voluntary for the senior students and compulsory for the junior students. Each student is permitted to attend the church of his choice. Bible instruction for the primary pupils is provided for by the College.

## APPRECIATION.

Before closing this report, I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation of the Board of Education, and also of the Finance Committee. I have been greatly helped by the many words of encouragement and kindly advice. But for these I sometimes feel that it would have been impossible for us to have gone on with any degree of courage, through the days of darkness and sorrow. # REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

### E. A. GRUVER, SUPERINTENDENT.

To the Iowa State Board of Education-

#### Gentlemen:

I herewith submit for your consideration the thirty-fourth biennial report of the Iowa School for the Deaf, covering the period from July 1, 1918 to June 30, 1920.

The report embraces parts of two administrations; that of Superintendent Henry W. Rothert, deceased, and of the present Superintendent, whose term of office began August 1, 1919.

The Iowa School for the Deaf has been in operation since 1855, growing rapidly from its small beginning in Iowa City to its present large plant with spacious buildings and grounds. During that time it has had seven Superintendents, and nearly 2,000 deaf children have received instruction in the school. It has had an honorable career. Many successful superintendents, principals, teachers, employees and pupils have been connected with it; and its high position in the State and Country is known and recognized. This is largely due to the earnest efforts and unflagging zeal of the lamented Henry W. Rothert, who for thirty-two years was Superintendent, during a period of its greatest development and most substantial progress. In June, 1919, the State Board of Education, recognizing his long and faithful service, made him Superintendent Emeritus on a salary. He withdrew from active service on July 31, 1919, taking up his residence in Council Bluffs, where he lived until his death, January 29, 1920.

Notwithstanding the unfavorable labor and other conditions and the consequent very serious hindrance to good work, the school has had a prosperous two years, with an increase in the classroom enrollment. The officers, teachers and employees have performed their various duties with faithfulness and success; the pupils have been punctual and attentive to their studies, and the parents and friends have been thoughtful, helpful and sympathetic.
