


**ANNUAL REPORT**

**STATEWIDE FAMILY PRACTICE TRAINING PROGRAM**

*Legislation enabling a statewide network of community-based family practice residency programs was enacted by the legislature in 1973. The Code of Iowa assigns to the Dean of the College of Medicine the responsibility of administering the statewide program, and it asks the College to provide educational and technical support to the individual programs, all of which are formally affiliated with The University of Iowa.*

**PROGRAMS**

The statewide program comprises eight family practice residencies in seven Iowa communities: Cedar Rapids, Davenport, Des Moines (2), Iowa City, Mason City, Sioux City, and Waterloo. (See Figure 1).

**ENROLLMENT**

The current enrollment across the three years of residency is 153. Fifty-three residents will complete their final year of training in 2002.

**STUDENT INTEREST**

Approximately seven U.S. medical student applications are submitted for each first-year position offered in the statewide program. The residents enrolled in the eight programs represent thirty-two medical colleges. During the past five years, 23% of UI medical graduates have entered family practice residencies, which is well above the national average for USMDs during the same period. Student interest in family practice as a career choice has declined across all US medical schools in recent years. As a result, recruitment of medical students for residency positions is extremely competitive.


**PATIENT CARE**

The number of Iowans receiving family medical care at the offices of the family practice training programs has increased significantly over the life of the statewide program. The total number of patient visits at the family practice centers was over 190,000 in 2000-01.

## PRACTICE LOCATIONS

Fifty-seven percent of the 2001 residency graduates entered practice in Iowa. During the past 25 years, three out of five graduates have entered practice in Iowa. Forty-five percent of the graduates selecting Iowa sites have chosen communities with populations under 10,000. One fourth have located in the metro areas where the training programs are based. Iowa towns where graduates are currently practicing are shown in Figure 2.

## VISITING PROFESSOR PROGRAM

College of Medicine faculty conduct over 130 teaching visits annually at the sites of the affiliated community-based family practice programs. These teaching visits supplement instruction by full-time residency faculty and volunteer community physicians.

## PROGRAM COSTS AND SOURCES OF SUPPORT

The aggregate costs of the Statewide Family Practice Training Program were \$35,855,719 in 2000-01. The 2000-01 appropriation for family practice education was \$2,460,405. From the appropriation, individual training programs received \$1,968,324 in training grants, and \$492,081 in education support and administrative services.



## Uses of Financial Support




**Total Program Expense = \$35,855,719**
